

To Fellow Congregational Members:

With input from the ELCA Research Committee and after careful, deliberate discussion, the Church Council has approved the attached agenda and questions for the upcoming forum with representative(s) from the ELCA. While the exact date of the forum has not yet been determined, Council has agreed it would not occur until after Holy Week. Once the date and time are determined, it will be posted in the weekly bulletin and e-mailed to all members who have addresses with the church office. The goal of the forum is to have a civil discussion that is both respectful of all viewpoints and one that will provide members a better understanding of the operations, policy and doctrine of the ELCA, their impact on our congregation, and what role our congregation has within the ELCA as one of its members. No votes will be held at the forum, and there will be no business conducted that would require action from the congregation. On behalf of Church Council, I encourage all members who are able to attend. Should you have any questions regarding the forum agenda, the questions that will be asked, or the process up to this point, please do not hesitate to reach out to myself or a fellow Council member.

1. What is the organizational structure of the ELCA from the local congregation level to the national level? When changes are considered (for example, to the constitution or governing documents) at the national or regional level, who initiates these changes and what is the process for implementation of said changes? When considering such changes, how are the changes communicated to ensure all congregations are aware and can be heard? If changes or amendments are adopted at the national or regional level, what effect does this have at the local congregational level? Are congregations required to adopt or enforce any changes or amendments approved at the national or regional level?

2. Within the ELCA, who is responsible for interpreting scripture and establishing doctrine for the church's guidance? What is the process? If a member congregation has a differing interpretation than the ELCA, are there any ramifications for the member church? Are varying interpretations allowed? If so, why are varying interpretation allowed?

3. Do politics influence the ELCA? If so, how? What role, if any, does the ELCA play in politics? Does the ELCA give preference to any party, give financially to any party, or utilize funds for lobbying? Who in the ELCA determines what issues are of most importance and what is the process? How does the ELCA ensure its positions reflect all of its congregations? What issues has the ELCA been involved with over the last five years and what is their position?

4. Martin Luther once said at the Diet of Worms, "Since then your serene majesty and your lordships seek a simple answer, I will give it in this manner... Unless I am convinced by the testimony of the Scriptures or by clear reason, I am bound by the Scriptures I have quoted and my conscience is captive to the Word of God. I cannot and I will not retract anything, since it is neither safe nor right to go against conscience. I cannot do otherwise, here I stand. May God help me, Amen."

On Pages 19-21 of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America's, "A Social Statement on Human Sexuality: Gift & Trust," (https://www.elca.org/Faith/Faith-and-Society/Social-Statements/Human-Sexuality) the following is stated with regards to bound conscience:

"In response, this church draws on the foundational Lutheran understanding that the baptized are called to discern God's love in service to the neighbor. In our Christian freedom, we therefore seek responsible actions that serve others and do so with humility and deep respect for the conscience-bound beliefs of others. We understand that, in this discernment about ethics and church practice, faithful people can and will come to different conclusions about the meaning of Scripture and about what constitutes responsible action. We further believe that this church, on the basis of "the bound conscience," will include these different understandings and practices within its life as it seeks to live out its mission and ministry in the world. This church recognizes that, with conviction and integrity:

1. On the basis of conscience-bound belief, some are convinced that same-gender sexual behavior is sinful, contrary to biblical teaching and their understanding of natural law. They believe same-gender sexual behavior carries the grave danger of unrepentant sin. They therefore conclude that the neighbor and the community are best served by calling people in same-gender sexual relationships to repentance for that behavior and to a celibate lifestyle. Such decisions are intended to be accompanied by pastoral response and community support.

2. On the basis of conscience-bound belief, some are convinced that homosexuality and even lifelong, monogamous, homosexual relationships reflect a broken world in which some relationships do not pattern themselves after the creation God intended. While they acknowledge that such relationships may be lived out with mutuality and care, they do not believe that the neighbor or community are best served by publicly recognizing such relationships as traditional marriage.

3. On the basis of conscience-bound belief, some are convinced that the scriptural witness does not address the context of sexual orientation and lifelong loving and committed relationships that we experience today. They believe that the neighbor and community are best served when same-gender relationships are honored and held to high standards and public accountability, but they do not equate these relationships with marriage. They do, however, affirm the need for community support and the role of pastoral care and may wish to surround lifelong, monogamous relationships or covenant unions with prayer.

4. On the basis of conscience-bound belief, some are convinced that the scriptural witness does not address the context of sexual orientation and committed relationships that we experience today. They believe that the neighbor and community are best served when same-gender relationships are lived out with lifelong and monogamous commitments that are held to the same rigorous standards, sexual ethics, and status as heterosexual marriage. They surround such couples and their lifelong commitments with prayer to live in ways that glorify God, find strength for the challenges that will be faced, and serve others. They believe same-gender couples should avail themselves of social and legal support for themselves, their children, and other dependents and seek the highest legal accountability available for their relationships."

Within the ELCA, please explain what bound conscience is as it relates to the human sexuality statement drafted in 2009. Are there currently any efforts within the ELCA to redefine or alter how bound conscience applies to human sexuality? If so, please explain what those efforts may be and what impact they may have on congregations. 5. Please explain what it means to become Reconciled in Christ. How does it apply at the national, regional (synod), and local level? If a synod becomes Reconciled in Christ, how does that affect the congregations that make up the Synod?

6. Is there an effort within the ELCA to remove the term "Father" or the use of "He" as it relates to God and replace it with gender neutral language?7. What is the ELCA's doctrine as it pertains to marriage? How was that doctrine determined? Are varying interpretations allowed?

8. Does the ELCA have an official stance on abortion or support abortion as a form of birth control? If so, please explain.

9. Does the ELCA have an official stance on critical race theory? If so, please explain what it is and what affect it has on member congregations. If there is no official stance, does the ELCA encourage or tolerate those in leadership positions who advocate either for or against teaching critical race theory?

10. Does the ELCA have an official stance on paying reparations to the descendants of African slaves? If so, please explain what it is and what affect it has on member congregations. If there is no official stance, does the ELCA encourage or tolerate those in leadership positions who advocate either for or against paying reparations to the descendants of African slaves?

11. Does the ELCA have an official stance on capitalist individualism, collectivism, or socialism and actively promote any of these ideas? If so, please explain and describe what affect it has on member congregations. If there is no official stance, does the ELCA encourage or tolerate those in leadership positions who advocate for or against practicing / teaching these ideas?
